

From the Minister



Dear Friends,

Though some of us would have wanted to have more sunny days this summer, or more school holidays, it was yet another good season for many to relax, catch-up with friends and family, or just to get out for the day. For the next month or so we'll still be able to enjoy summer days and then comes the beauty in a variety of different autumn colours. As the seasons bring forth change in nature, so we know that time bring change about in our lives. Different seasons with different tones to it. Here at Park Church, it's a privilege to be part of the lives of many people and to see that different people are in different seasons of their lives; some celebrating the birth of a child or grandchild, a milestone anniversary, retirement, a good golfing season etcetera. This, whilst others might experience life differently; increased difficulty with health issues, a goodbye to someone special who lives far away, or the loss of a loved one.

As much as we experience joy and love, there might be days when we feel invisible and unloved. It reminds me of the story of Elijah who after a difficult time being isolated, announced that the Lord would bring drought over the land for a few years (1 Kings 17). In the region of Zarephath lived a widow with her young boy who struggled to survive and meet their daily needs of food and water. This widow soon realised that they would die from the ravage of famine. All hope had gone. No husband meant no one to provide for them.

But during this same time, God instructed Elijah to go to the region of Zarephath and find this window there. Never could she have imagined that deliverance would come from a stranger who looked as hungry as she did. A stranger who asked the impossible from her: bread from the mouth of her starving child. But this stranger would introduce her to a God who did things differently. A God who keeps his promise and would surprise her by simply turning up!

What do we do when we run out of options? How is it that sometimes we're beaten in whichever direction we take? Why does it appear that our calls for help seem destined for disappointment? Is there no way out? It might feel like that, but don't give up! Remember, God doesn't always use recognised channels to come to our aid. Listen carefully for His voice, because He is listening for ours.

But who was this woman to whom God showed such love and compassion? We don't even know her name. In her day, a woman's name was only of importance when related to her husband. Once he died she became a nonentity, No one to provide for her... until, that is, her son became a man. For this woman to lose her son and her husband would be

disastrous. Her son was her only hope of a future. Was she destined to become another nameless statistic of the enveloping famine? Nothing could be further from the truth as far as God was concerned, for when God said His plan of protection and provision motion for His servant Elijah, He had someone else on His mind. God could have sent Elijah to a wealthy family just as easily as to this starving, poverty-stricken woman, but that's not God's way. Yes, He wanted His servant to realise that He could care for him behind Israel's borders, but He also wanted a broken woman to know that she mattered just as much.

After the arrival of Elijah at the house of the widow of Zarephath, miracles happened daily in this widow's life whilst taking on her daily tasks. Each morning, when she shook that flour bin and lifted the oil flask, she not only re-encountered the miraculous but also had daily confirmation that the God of heaven loved her.

Her identity was no longer determined by her husband's name but by the grace of God. He was the One who knew her name. Much lay ahead for this precious woman, but for now, she was experiencing a new life, one that was about more than being able to bake bread each morning.

The God who knew her name wanted her to know His. Little by little she would come to know much more than that.

This is also true for us when we feel unloved or invisible; God knows our name and we mean the world to Him; we matter to Him.

May you find the love and miracles of God in your daily living and tasks, seek Him, and see Him, even amidst the dreariest draughts or seasons in life – He is with you, and He is for you!

Update from Session

The Kirk Session last met in early June.. Among the items agreed was the opening of the Church and Tower on the afternoon of Sunday 24th September as part of Stirling Doors Open weekend. This is an opportunity to see the big bell and the great view from the tower, as well as to hear our minister playing the organ. We also agreed to the use of the Hall for a demonstration of the work of a local primary school class to their parents as part of our community outreach. We were heartened by the very positive feedback from the recent Popcorn and Cake schools event which was attended by almost 130 children over three days. Sarah Murdoch has been asked to lead a new Hospitality team, whilst Marjorie McGowan continues to coordinate coffee after Sunday services and the Thursday coffee club.

Session heard that Mrs Jessie Mackinnon was stepping down as a trustee and active elder after almost 50 years of very dedicated and diligent service because of difficulty attending meetings. Elders recorded their sincere appreciation for such a contribution and wished her every future blessing as she recovers from a number of falls.

My personal highlight of the Session's business in the last three month was the admission of Calum and Lucas as members by profession of faith. It was real blessing and joy to welcome these two young men. I am also hugely encouraged by the gradual increase in attendances on a Sunday and involvement in other activities, which are a reflection of Attie's ministry but also of the welcome and friendship given to visitors and others by so many of you.

Although we had a break in routine meetings till the start of September, a great deal of invaluable work has continued behind the scenes. For example, the garden and grass cutting teams have done a great job in maintaining and improving our grounds, 31 of our elders and 21 of our volunteers have completed safeguarding training updates which our safeguarding coordinators organised for local congregations, Stirling Kirks together and Sunday after church and Thursday coffee teams have maintained hospitality for increasing numbers throughout holiday months and SPARKS helpers have reviewed and cleaned all their equipment. Sheena Tait's support in the office remains invaluable.

Park Church is truly blessed to have a large number of capable and willing people supporting the work of the Church, but we are always looking for more folk to be involved. We are very dependent on our various committees and teams. We review and seek to refresh membership of session committees every November; members of these do not have to be elders and we welcome new talent and any expressions of interest and any practical help. NEWS FROM PARIS OF A NEW MINISTER AT OUR TWINNED CONGREGATION PENTEMONT-LUXEMBOURG

This profile is from the church website with translation

I was born in 1991 in Lyon (world gastronomic capital as everyone knows!), where part of my family still lives.

After completing my degree in Theology at the Protestant Institute of Theology (IPT) in Paris, I left for a master's degree in the United States, in Holland, Michigan, with a thesis on the question of the Church and the violence.

Back in France, I'm doing a new master's degree at the IPT while living... rue Madame. I was lucky enough to be able to spend a year in this parish before my internship year at Chambon sur Lignon. My first position was, in 2016, in the parish of the United Protestant Church in Le Mans and in Sarthe, where I spent 7 years. During these years I was also invested in the preparation of the Grand Kiff 2021 and in the Regional Council of the Western Region of the United Protestant Church of France.

I am very happy to be pastor of the United Protestant Church of Pentemont-Luxembourg since July 2023, alongside my colleague, Christian!

Listening and sharing are essential for me so that we can become one body together, whether at local or regional level, and move forward in our projects but also in our faith. Moving forward together, each and everyone at our own pace to discover, or rediscover the riches of faith and the beauty of God's gifts, this is, let's say, my way of living the ministry. The Church is for me like a Savoyard fondue (yes, I like culinary examples, and knowing that Christ spent a lot of time around a table...), each and everyone has their own piece of bread, but all in the same pan of cheese, and if there is enough cheese (of trust and love), threads are woven between the pieces of bread connecting us to each other, and to Christ. And there will always be enough room for a new piece of bread!

Street (AND Campus) Pastors

I have recently completed a training programme as a volunteer with Stirling Street Pastors, SSP, who have their base in the second floor former Boys Bible Class room in Park Church. I had long been impressed by their work of caring, listening and helping the vulnerable; and had expressed an interest in supporting their teams particularly on Campus.

This was a very comprehensive and enlightening programme with monthly day long sessions for six months shared with colleagues from Perth and Falkirk as well as Stirling. Topics included Roles and Responsibilities, Listening Skills, Youth Culture, Drug and Alcohol Awareness (which opened my eyes even as an experienced doctor), Mental Health, Advice from the Police, First Aid and sharing our faith (only if invited to do so) This was very worthwhile preparation.

We also had two supervised patrols - I had one Friday night (10pm – 3am) patrol with pastors in Stirling City Centre and one on a Friday afternoon (noon-3pm) in the Stirling University campus. The Friday night was said to be relatively quiet but I was impressed and encouraged by the cordial relationships with security staff in all the local bars and clubs and the local police who looked to the street pastors to help avoid trouble and support potentially vulnerable young and middle-aged men and women looking for support and care. They and the CCTV operators also directed us to potential need. The regulars recognised and greeted pastors and we had several helpful conversations with sometimes lonely and distressed people, sharing water or sweets (which may ameliorate effects of drugs and alcohol), giving flip flops to those who had lost their shoes and seeking to ensure they got home safely with friends or taxis.

The Stirling Street Pastors were invited onto campus by the University in the pandemic when there were many international students who were very isolated and unable to return home for a year or more in many instances. Significant numbers appreciated the opportunity for a listening ear and friendly chat and the authorities encouraged the street pastors to continue these patrols as they value their contribution to student well-being.

I now go out for 2-3 hours walking around campus on a Friday afternoon with a colleague wearing our distinctive uniforms (once every three weeks on average). Many students and staff are keen to chat, some lonely and homesick, some very anxious about forthcoming exams, presentations or future prospects, others are depressed. A surprising number ask us why we do what we do and this may open up deeper conversations. We are often asked what church we belong to- and most are surprised when we reply that we belong to different churches but work together as concerned Christians. I have been on patrol with members of other local Church of Scotland congregations, Roman Catholic, Episcopal, Baptist, UF and Cornerstone colleagues.

Over the summer there have also been very positive encounters with summer school participants and other visitors to the University. I have found my involvement to be both interesting and rewarding – it is a privilege to be able to meet and talk to so many people. We always start our patrol with a brief prayer usually asking for safety and God's wisdom to speak and act sensitively and appropriately, and finish up with a short prayer for those we have met. We really appreciate the support in prayer of family and friends.

Stirling Street Pastors need more volunteers so they can patrol in the city centre every Friday and Saturday evenings, and on the university campus every Friday afternoon. You can be a street pastor just for afternoon or just for evening patrols.

To draw attention to this new venture the Trustees of the Visitors Centre are holding a Coffee Morning on Saturday 16th September from 10am-12pm in Bridge of Allan Parish Church to raise funds to support Stirling's newest prison. This is the first coffee morning since Covid.

A FAVOURITE HYMN.

GLORY BE TO GOD THE FATHER HYMN 110.

The words of this wonderful Hymn were written by Horatius Bonar (1808 – 1889), a Scottish Minister who moved to the Free Church after the Disruption and became Moderator of the General Assembly of that Church.

He wrote 600 Hymns, some of which were for the Moody and Sankey revival meetings.

This hymn is based on the Lesser Doxology which was sung at the end of Psalms. Each verse is the outpouring of praise ranging from Glory to the Trinity in verse 1 to the King of Angels in verse 3. The final verse speaks of the Choir of Angels singing "Glory to the King of Kings".

The tune Regent Square was composed by Henry Smart (1813 – 18790, and is named after a Presbyterian Church in London. Smart was a famous organist who became editor of the Scottish Presbyterian Hymn Book.

Van Wyk Family Recipe for Baked Chocolate Pudding

Attie writes: This easy-to-make chocolate pudding with its own sauce was always an all-round favourite of our family and dates back to 1951. On a cold Sunday this is a winner, especially when you add a dash of custard, ice cream, or evaporated milk on top of it!

NB Measurements in cups are 250ml

Ingredients:

(Dough)

1 cup self- raising flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

½ teaspoon table salt

½ cup white sugar

1 ½ tablespoon cocoa powder

(Topping)

½ cup (cows) milk

1 tablespoon melted butter/margarine

1 tablespoon vanilla essence

½ cup brown sugar

2 tablespoons cocoa powder

3 cups of boiling water



Method:

Mix the first 5 ingredients.

Mix the milk, butter/margarine, and vanilla essence. Then mix it in with the first mixture of ingredients. Stir and mix well.

Place the dough batter in a greased baking dish.

Mix the remaining ingredients: ½ cup brown sugar, 2 tablespoons cocoa powder, and 3 cups of boiling water, and pour gently over the dough batter.

Bake the pudding for 30mins at 180 degrees Celsius.

The pudding makes its own sauce.
