From the Minister

Dear Friends,

Most of us know the words to Petula Clark's top hit, 'Downtown':

"When you're alone, and life is making you lonely you can always go:

Down tow n.

When you've got worries, all the noise and the hurry seems to help, I know, Down tow n...

You can forget all your troubles, forget all your cares. So go downtown,

things'll be great when you're Downtown, no finer place for sure.

Downtown everything's waiting for you."

It's on miserable stormy days, like today, when I would like to tell Petula th at going downtown won't help at all. It also doesn't only need bad weather to get us to feel down. There are so many things on our mind that distract us; thoughts, challenges, longings, you nameit. But it's especially during difficult days when I remind myself that God's love for us is not dependent on the weather or any of our moods and emotions. He is there for us regardless of where we are and how we might feel.

The writer of Genesis 18:14 asks the question when Abraham and Sarah are struggling with various things in their lives: *'Is anything too hard for the Lord?'*

It reminds me that it's about my approach and attitude towards life, and essentially towards God. And I remind myself then that nothing but nothing is too unimportant to pray about or too big for God to handle. I didn'tsayhe would grant all our wishes, but he is able to handle any situat ion. Yet sometimes, we might spend more time worrying about our

troubles than praying about them. And we might spendmore time fretting about our problems than attemptsolving them, again attitude.

A far betterstrategy, of course, is to pray as if everything depended entir ely upon God and to work as if everything depended entirely upon us; a double-sided coin. Now it might be that we often know precisely what needs to be done, but we may be slow in doing it - especially if what needs to be done is difficult or un comfortable for us. So we put off till to morrow that which should be done today. This again boils down to our attitude, as we have the ability to adjust or rea djust our attitude.

Doing what is right means doing the uncomfortable with confronting our problems soon er rather than later.

If you want to defeat Old Man Trouble, you need the right kind of attitude: th epositive kind. So what is your attitude today? What is withholding you from addr essing certain matters? Is it fear, anger, are you just bored, or is it worries dragging you down? Are you pessimistic, perplexed, or in pain? Maybe you are moping around with a frown on your face that's almost as big asheone in you rheart. If so, God wants to have a little talk with you. God created you in his own image, and he wants you to experience joy, contentment, peace, and abundance. But God will not force you to experience these things; you must claim them for yourself.

Paul writes in 2 Timothy 1:7: 'The Spirit God gave us does not make us ti mid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline.'

God is giving you free will, including the ability to influence the direction and the tone of your thoughts. And God wants you to direct those thoughts to "whatever is true, whatever is noble, whateverisright, whatever ispure, wh atever is lovely, whatever is admirable" (Philippians 4:8).

So, the next time you find yourself dwelling upon the negative aspects of your life, refocus your attention on things positive. Yes, may be you can't go to metaphorically speaking 'Downtow n', whatever that space or place may be, but take a look around you; your neighbours, your friends, your family, your home, the privileges you have that many others in other parts of the world can only dream of. The next time you find yourself falling pr ey to the blight of pessimism, stop yourself and turn your thoughts around. Adopt an attitude of gratitude.

No matter how heavy the burden, daily strength is given by the Living God who doesn't change his love for us. So, I expect we need not give our selves too much if any concern as to what the outcome will be.We must simply go forward in the strength of God. Lent affords us the opportunity to search the depths of our lives, even with our shortcomings, and at the same time experience the heights of God's love.

So, may you experience the heights of God's love in new and astonishing ways as never before during this Lent and Easter!

From the Session Clerk

Spring is an encouraging and sometimes exciting time as familiar shoots re-emerge, together with some unexpected new surprises. It has been similar in the Church. It was great to see record numbers attending Christmas services and good numbers including several visitors attending on Sunday mornings since then, despite the inclement weather. Many others enjoy watching the streamed services accessible on the church website or listening to audio recordings and we are most grateful to lan Jones, Gordon Luke and Helen McDonald for their help in this. It was also encouraging to hear of a new informal house group for members under 35.

The finance team have introduced new accounting systems as well as working on the accounts for 2023. These should be finalised and details available for sharing in the next few weeks. Preliminary figures for 2023 suggest that voluntary donations have been maintained although Gift Aided giving has reduced. Gift Aided donations remain our main source of income. Income from hire of premises and rental of 22 Laurelhill Place are also invaluable, especially as utility costs previously on a bargain fixed term deal through the Church of Scotland <u>will be almost double in 2024</u>.

The property team have been assiduous in maintaining the church's buildings. The Rear Car Park behind the Hall is being repaired this spring.

The Youth Group continue to run the very popular SPARKS pre-school group, and work together with friends in St Ninians Old to offer schools initiatives in March and May in Park Church and a shared Easter Holiday Club in April.

The joint Stirling Kirks Together Monthly Friendship lunches continue to increase in attendance and currently attracts up to 60 people.

However good stewardship of finance and property are both merely means towards an end, to further God's Kingdom. The last two Kirk Session meetings have focussed on how we engage with our local community in Stirling and in particular how we might be more missional, reaching out to others. Attie explained the so called 5 marks of Mission:- to share the good news of the gospel, to nurture people , to serve communities, to challenge injustice and to foster worshipping communities. Or to put it another way- to Tell, to Teach, to Tend, to Transform and to Treasure.

The Perth Presbytery Mission Plan envisages us working closely with neighbouring congregations as a team (primarily with St Ninians Old Parish and Holy Rude Viewfield). Session agreed we all need to get to know each other better and encourage all our congregations to experience services and events in each other's churches. There are particular opportunities in forthcoming shared Lenten Bible studies, the World Day of Prayer service on 1st March and the Easter week services with refreshments afterwards held every evening in a different church with a different minister. There also be a short informal Easter early morning service in Kings Park followed by breakfast in Park Church . After Easter we might explore opportunities for mutual help, shared initiatives, occasional evening or midweek services and house groups.

Session agreed we should focus on how we might reach out, recognising and building on our strengths, on sharing our different gifts, complimenting rather than competing and supporting shared initiatives particularly to engage with younger people. The short to medium term future is likely to involve a reduction in the availability of full-time ministers who face increasing demands, including often having to help others by acting as Interim Moderators elsewhere. Park Church is exceedingly blessed in having such an inspiring and committed minister.as Attie. I know he appreciates the support of office bearers and the whole congregation in many different ways but this will be needed more than ever.

We value your prayerful and practical support as we seek to work more effectively with others to meet some of the challenges in Stirling and to embrace some of the opportunities that may emerge and surprise.

World Day of Prayer

The origins of World Day of Prayer date back to the 19th century when Christian women of the United States and Canada initiated a variety of activities in support of women's involvement in mission at home and in other parts of the world.

These activities related to:

- concern for women and children
- the role of prayer in mission work
- a vision of Christian unity
- biblical study as everyone's responsibility
 social issues and working with
- immigrants
- linking world peace with world mission

In 1926 the women of North America distributed the worship service to many countries and partners in mission. The response world-wide was enthusiastic; thus the call was issued for a world Day of Prayer.

World Day of Prayer came to these

islands through the missionary activity of a Scots woman, Grace Forgan, who heard of the movement at an international missionary gathering in Jerusalem in 1928. The first service was held in Scotland in 1930, then in England in 1932, Wales in 1933, Republic of Ireland in 1935 and Northern Ireland in 1943. In England, Wales and Northern Ireland the Day of Prayer is organised through:

- A National Committee that edits the service and prepares and distributes resource material to its branches
- Regional Days held around the country that help local branches to prepare for the next Day of Prayer
- Over 2,500 inter-denominational Local Branch Committees whose members promote the service in their churches and jointly organise the Day of Prayer in their area

Offerings from the service are used to support the work of the World Day of Prayer and projects run by Christian Charities

An interesting experience

On 4th July last year the BBC's Antiques Roadshow came to Pollok House, Glasgow – and so did we!

A good friend of my family, who had known me since I was a baby, died in January that year and we were asked if we would like anything from her house. I was thinking of items for the Art Club at Park Church and saw what I thought was a ceramic vase on a high shelf. It turned out to be a very dusty bottle which was dated 1828. So we thought it might be fun to see what Antiques Roadshow made of it.

Peter and I had an afternoon slot (which was just as well as it fairly chucked it down in the morning) and arrived in good time to join the endless queues snaking their way around the gardens. It was all very well organised: a security check of bags, a triage system to identify which expert we were to go to and, of course, another queue for the actual valuer. There were lots of opportunities to chat with folk – where are you from? What item have you brought? Isn't it a shame about the weather? Where's the café? Etc. There seemed to be hundreds of mad dogs and families with young kids and most people were very good humoured and the experts were so kind and patient with the public, especially those who they could see were nervous.


Slowly the production team identified the items or stories they thought might be of interest and we were then told to sit in a tent and wait to be interviewed by a producer to be further assessed. Unfortunately, as we had been told to go immediately to the glass expert, this meant that we weren't able to see any of the other stalls and we were stuck for an hour. But we then spoke to Will Farmer, the glass expert and host for the day, and then he went off (with our bottle) to do some further research on it. Or, more likely, to pass it on to a researcher. So we were free for 2 hours to look around the other stalls and, when the sun came out, so did Fiona Bruce!

Whether you love her or loathe her, you would have to admire her professionalism – she fairly worked the crowd, cuddling dogs and babies and chatting to everyone. She also filmed 3 separate sessions of 'guess the most expensive'. We were told that our bottle would be filmed if we could hang around until 6.30pm, so we checked with our dog sitter and went for a cuppa. In the end we had to do 8 takes as the planes started flying overhead or the editor wanted some other angle to be included and so on.

If you watch the programme, you will know that they have started a short 'follow up' section at the end and in late August I had a phone call from the production team to ask me if I was going to take the bottle to our Art Club? Of course I was!

So the next Thursday Attie kindly did a brilliant video of our Club with the bottle as part of the still life we were painting/drawing and I think everyone enjoyed being part of that – though it was a shame that two of our regulars were away on holiday. At the time of writing this I do not know how they will edit my contribution or the follow up piece – I just hope our Club is featured. It is due to be screened on Sunday 11th February. And, yes, I am selling the bottle!

When we think of Palm Sunday, crowds of people took to the streets to see and celebrate Jesus and the fact that he cared and reached out to everyone.

The Christian calendar is divided up by festivals and seasons.

Some, like Christmas Day, happen on the same date every year, while others move around within a range of dates. The main festival that moves is Easter, and since many other festivals have their dates fixed in relation to Easter, they move with it.

Lent (13 February - 24th March)

Lent is the 40-day period before Easter, beginning with Ash Wednesday. During Lent Christians may fast, or give up some of their usual routine, to give time to personal examination and to reflect on their relationship with God.

Holy Week (25 - 30 March 2024)

Holy Week is the last week of Lent. It is the week preceding Easter and the period in the Christian year when Christians remember the last week in Jesus' life.

Easter

Easter is the season in which Christians remember the death and resurrection of Jesus. It is the most important festival in the Christian year.

Good Friday - 29th March Holy Saturday - 30th March Easter Sunday or Easter Day - 31st March Easter Monday - 1st April

Pentecost-Whit Sunday 19th May 2024

Ascension Day commemorates the ascension of Jesus into heaven 40 days after his resurrection from the dead. It can be understood traditionally as his taking up into heaven at the conclusion of his earthly ministry.

Looking back to Christmas: youth activities

"Bubblegum & Fluff"

At the beginning of December we completed our first schools programme "Bubblegum & Fluff" with Primary 5 children from Allans PS, Borestone PS and St Ninians PS. As usual the children engaged with the activities and enjoyed being involved. The high numbers (135 children over the 5 sessions) required a bit more work and commitment than usual, but one of the joys of smaller numbers at each session meant that we were really able to interact during group work and get to know the children during this short time. We had our very willing and dedicated group of helpers without whom the programme could not run, and as well as our "stalwarts" we had a few new helpers participating for the first time. Enormous thanks comes from the Youth Committee for all the help given us as a group. We really feel supported by the Kirk Session and members of the congregation.

As this is the first time the children from senior stages come along to the church to join in our schools programmes we feel that an important aim is that they enjoy the experience as well as learning something new. It is also useful for later programmes because, if they recall their enjoyment they are more likely to be comfortable participating in later programmes right from the start. We give out evaluation sheets to both children and the adults who accompany them, both teachers and helpers to let us know how they have felt about the experience and responses were positive.

A Burns Grace

At the Ladies Group Burns evening held in January, which was enjoyed by several men as well as ladies, David Sibbald told us that Burns was not against Christianity but merely the hypocrisy of many in the church at that time.

He reminded the audience that Robert Burns did not write the Selkirk Grace ("Some hae meat and cannae eat..") . This was probably written 100 years earlier by covenanters but Burns popularised it by using it at a dinner hosted by the Earl of Selkirk at the Selkirk Arms in Kircudbright.

However there is one that he wrote himself but it is less well known:

Before the meal

O Thou, who kindly dost provide

For ev'ry creatures want!

We bless the God of Nature wide

For all Thy goodness lent.

And if it please Thee, heavenly Guide,

May never worse be sent;

But, whether granted or denied, Lord bless us with content.

A FAVOURITE HYMN.

THIS JOYFUL EASTERTIDE, HYMN 415.

Despite its importance, Easter is not so well served with music as Christmas.

This hymn, which is lively and light, has all the joyfulness of a carol, and first appeared in a Victorian carol book. Its author, George Woodward, was an English clergyman who translated many hymns from other languages.

This tune is from a popular Dutch song of the 17th century.

This Joyful Eastertide has 3 verses. In verse one, sin and sorrow are banished, the second verse looks forward to the dead being awakened by the trumpet, and the third verse speaks of Jesus crossing the river leading to the end of the chill of Death's flood. The chorus tells us of Christ bursting from his three-day prison, and the word "arisen" is repeated four times, each one higher in pitch. The music at the end is more elaborate and rises to a climax.

We look forward to singing this hymn on Easter Sunday.

Back ground:


The Queen's Island Victoria Male Choir was formed in 1974 when the two oldest choirs in the province amalgamated. The Queens Island Choir had been formed in 1912 and the Victoria Choir in 1916, both originating in the Harland & Wolff shipyard in Belfast.

During the early 1970's both choirs were finding it difficult to maintain their membership because of "The Troubles". Rather than disband they decided to join forces and the Queens's Island Victoria Male Voice Choir was born. The Choir is now established as one of the foremost in the province and devotes much of its time and energy to charity concerts and church services.





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Special treats with 15 items (easy Maths) and no baking needed

Many of us will recognise this recipe which we could maybe look forward to having after Lent?

Ingredients:

15 digestive biscuits
15 marshmallows
15 halved glace cherries
About 200mls condensed milk
100 grams desiccated coconut to coat

To make the "fifteens"

Crush the digestive biscuits in a food processor or in a plastic bag with a rolling pin and put the crumbs into a large mixing bowl.

Chop each marshmallow into 4 pieces and add to the bowl with the cherries and 175mls of the condensed milk.

Mix the ingredients until they are well combined and there is a sticky mixture. If it is too dry add a little more condensed milk.

To form the special treats

Place a large piece of cling film or foil on a flat surface and sprinkle most of the coconut onto the surface.

Tip the mixture onto the coconut and shape it into a long sausage, about 30cms X 5cms.

Sprinkle more coconut over the top of it and wrap the cling film or foil tightly around it twisting the ends together to seal the mixture inside.

Leave in the fridge to chill for 4 to 6 hours then open and cut into 15 slices and serve.

It will keep in the fridge up to one week wrapped in cling film.


