### Message from the Session Clerk

### **Kirk Session Update**

The Kirk Session met on 5<sup>th</sup> February, when it was very encouraged on several fronts, including:

### **New Visitors and Members**

It has been great to welcome and get to know new folk and old friends, and we are committed to helping everyone feel valued and at home in the church family. One consequence is that extra volunteers are needed to help with refreshments after church. This month we welcomed Thomas and Susie Dalgleish, and John Conway as new members.

### **Presbytery Review**

As summarised on the next page, the visiting Presbytery team last summer commended progress made by the congregation and endorsed its action plan, which elders review every month.

### **Property Maintenance**

Recent activity has included essential tree surgery in the front car park, repair of the CCTV and renovation of doors to the Main Hall, Gallery and Anderson Hall. This renovation involved scores of hours of painstaking work by the convenor Jim Gray, helped by John Magrath. We are getting a comprehensive review of the roof and exterior of the church through Stirling City Heritage Trust in the next few weeks. The Property committee has been very grateful for the expert input from Gordon Kerr for three decades. He will be reducing his commitment, but the property team is pleased to welcome Peter Langley as a new member.

### **Inter-generational Worship**

The Youth Committee will be more involved in all-age talks in the future. We have been encouraged by a national "Growing Young" organisation, focusing on the challenge of engaging and nurturing young people. Some elders will be attending a webinar in February about this and Session will be considering enrolling in their programme.

### Young Adults' Fellowship

The monthly evenings of worship food and fellowship have now outgrown the capacity of the manse because of increased numbers and have moved to church halls.

### **New Audio-Visual Project**

Work is scheduled for the end of April and beginning of May.

### **Extra Copies of Hymn Books**

We are buying more words-only hymn books to meet increased demand.

### **Links with Neighbouring Congregations**

We continue to work with neighbouring congregations in shared activities, such as monthly friendship lunches and forthcoming shared Holy Week services (details of which will be shared nearer the time) and explore future closer partnership and team ministry.

We are most grateful not only for those involved in these activities, but appreciate the multiple prayer and practical contributions and talents of so many more who enrich our church family. Please do not hesitate to contact myself or the Minister if you have any queries or suggestions.

### **Local Church Review - Park Church Stirling 2024**

The visiting team from the Presbytery of Perth shared their reports with members of Presbytery at its meeting on 1<sup>st</sup> February 2025. This included the agreed Action Plan and Presbytery agreed the resolutions noted on the next pages.

### Summary

The Local Church Review (LCR) Team visited Park Church in Stirling over the summer and autumn of 2024.

This is a "new" congregation, having only been in place since 2020, and with their current Minister since 2022. From the beginning of the visit there was positivity, excitement, optimism, commitment and a real desire to look to the future and grasp every opportunity, in the words of their Mission - to share the love of God in a modern world. This congregation is not going to stand still; they have a clear vision statement and even in the short time the Team was there, they could see achievements. The implementation of the new accounting system and the arrival of new members bringing, and willing to, share musical expertise, to name but two.

The financial situation is secure. The buildings are well looked after and the halls well used by various community groups. There is a thriving congregation, averaging around 110 on Sunday mornings, a small Sunday school and other opportunities for worship and study for members and members of other churches.

There is a strong working relationship between office bearers. The Kirk Session has produced a clear and achievable Action Plan, produced with full cognisance of the Five Marks of Misson and covering 4 main areas; the development of worship and music; the development of additional leadership and support to achieve greater resilience, capacity and fresh perspective; to clarify and make progress with the parish grouping and proposed team ministry; to explore the appointment of additional support staff.

The Team would like to send their best wishes to this congregation and give them every encouragement in taking forward their Action Plan.

thanks the Minister, Session Clerk/s, Office Bearers, Kirk Session and all Members of Park Church for the warm welcome, openness and frank discussion which took place during the course of the review;

acknowledges and commends the hard work, endeavour and achievements which have taken place since the establishment of the charge;

### **UPDATES FROM WINTER 2024**

### **Paediatric First Aid Course**

Last Autumn, 10 Sparks' helpers attended an all-day Paediatric First Aid training course, led by Scott McGregor (an experienced firefighter) from STA (Safety Training Awards), assisted by his wife (a qualified nurse). The qualification we gained is SQA accredited, HSE and Care Commission recognised.

This was very worthwhile, especially for those who had had no prior first aid training. Whilst we concentrated on how to administer first aid to children (from babies to teenagers), most of what we learned can also be applied to adults. We covered a wide range of situations and symptoms, from bandages and bleeding noses to CPR and using the Defibrillator. Some of this was quite daunting, and although we hoped we'd never have to apply some of our learned skills in the most serious of situations, we all felt that the course gave us more confidence to deal with children or adults in difficulty. It also provided us with some tools to help us anticipate and look out for dangers and obstacles that could be removed to prevent accidents and/or injuries occurring in the first place.











### **Stirling Street Pastors**

We may be familiar with the name, but who are Street Pastors and what do we do?



Street Pastors are Christian Volunteers from different churches, who care about the safety and wellbeing of individuals in the local

community and aim to be a caring, listening and helpful presence in our communities. We are trained to be approachable, non-judgemental to advise or care for anyone who needs support.

The service is welcomed by relevant statutory and voluntary agencies, including Police Scotland, as a complementary support for individuals in need or in distress. The Stirling group, women and men of all ages, offer peaceful and practical help to people who are out and about on the weekend night-time streets of Stirling and sometimes find themselves in trouble or needing help to get home safely, and on the university campus on a Friday.

As a relative newcomer to Stirling, I followed up on a longer-term interest in Street Pastors, something I had been thinking about for some time, having previous involvement in church youth work, which I enjoyed. I was interested to learn that Park Church is the base for Stirling Street Pastors and together with the witness and encouragement of Peter Murdoch, I explored the opportunity to serve.

First call was role specific training (12 sessions) which was invaluable, covering topics such as Roles and Responsibilities of a Street Pastor, Listening Skills, Youth Culture, Drug & Alcohol Awareness, Mental Health Awareness, First Aid, Safeguarding, Police Training, Knowing Your Community, Prayer and the Good News and Ethos. A level of training is mandatory and is accompanied by a Disclosure Scotland check and supported by continued professional development.

The approach in Stirling is very flexible, with options and choices about where we feel most able to serve, and there is a desired minimum commitment of around once a month. Interestingly, across the UK, other teams may offer the service in a number of different places and times, however we each have the same values and aims and our presence is obvious by our identifiable blue uniforms.

We carry water, basic first aid kit, space blankets, brush (for broken glass), sick bags, coffee, biscuits, lollipops and flip flops (!), particularly welcome by young people after a night of dancing in ill-fitting shoes. We can signpost to relevant services, and also provide a pocket-size information card. Some experienced volunteers also carry Narcan (naloxone) pens to administer for emergency drug overdose.

My main experience has been around the University campus, 2 hours on a Friday, and I have been surprised and encouraged by the engagement of students. We recognise that some may feel isolated, having come from other countries, and others may wish a listening ear – conversations are welcomed!

Peter and I speak regularly about the service, and we would be very pleased and encouraged if you have any questions, or want to ask about Street Pastors and the work that we all do.

Please pray for Street Pastors as we make ourselves available for this work of service.

### Hafvenstein Nepal Newsletter #28 - December 2024

Dear friends,

We've moved out of Kathmandu to start Fiona's fieldwork - and so far it's been wonderful. Thank you so much for keeping us in your prayers.

Tansen, where we're living now, is particularly special to us. Fiona was born in the mission hospital here, and Joel's family used to be based just an hour or two's drive away, so it was where they often came on holidays (or when anyone got sick). Twenty-four years ago, Tansen is where Joel and Fi unexpectedly ran into each other again as young adults and became friends. We spent happy weeks here as a family during our time serving with UMN.



It's a beautiful hilltop town with Himalayan views from its pine forests. We're staying in a traditional Nepali stone-and-adobe house (albeit one with indoor plumbing) with hammocks on the balcony and a treehouse just outside. The boys have made friends with the doctors' kids who live nearby. We're all enjoying being part of the fantastic community in and around the Tansen hospital and the local churches.

Looking back at our key prayer requests from last time: we're happy to report that the visa renewal process went smoothly, as did preparations for home school and packing up/handing over our home to subletters.

The research authorization has had a few more hiccups. Getting remote-area research permission for Dolpa up on the Tibet border turned out to be a more complex process than Fiona had been told (including by the district government head himself, when she visited Dolpa in the spring). In the end we weren't able to get the special permit this year, and will have to try again next year.

But that may be a blessing in disguise. Some of the medicinal plants Fiona is most interested in will be in season in Dolpa in the autumn, rather than spring, when we'd planned to be there. The delay also gives us more flexibility in the first two stages of fieldwork, Tansen and Rukum, which we can now stretch out into the months we'd originally planned to spend in Dolpa.

That flex has been helpful, since getting research authorisation for our time in Rukum is also taking a little longer than expected. Please pray that permission from the Nepal Health Research Council now comes quickly, so that we can get a good start in Rukum from January 2025.

With regard to Fi's health, she was hit by some longer and more intense migraines when we first got here, but soldiered through and has as planned been refining her questionnaires through practice with doctors and patients here. Please pray for continued energy and good health as she completes this phase of her work.


She's also planning a pre-Christmas visit back to Kathmandu to share her MSc research results and meet some people who may be helpful in getting the Dolpa research permits next year. We'd be grateful for prayer for safety, health, and favor on that trip.

Isaac is just young enough to join the tutorial group of hospital staff kids, while Joel has started home -schooling Caleb, which is going well. The three of them have gone on day trips to visit Joel's old home in Galyang, as well as Butwal, where Fiona's family was based when she was born, and to the Rani Mahal, an old palace in the Kali Gandaki river valley. Both boys are thriving here, which is a real answer to prayer!

Thank you so much, again, for supporting us in this stage of our work in Nepal. Your prayer opens the doors for us to serve.

### **Bubblegum & Fluff - December 2024**

During the early part of December, we completed our first schools' programme "Bubblegum & Fluff", with Primary 5 children from Allan's PS and St Ninians PS. Unfortunately, Borestone PS was unable to participate this year, which meant that we were only able to engage with 80 children. However, the smaller numbers meant that we only had to cover 3 sessions over 2 days, instead of 5 sessions over 3 days (as had become the norm). As usual, the children engaged with the activities and enjoyed being involved. We had our very willing and dedicated group of helpers, without whom the programme could not run, and the Youth Committee thanks everyone for all their help and enthusiasm.

As this is the first time the children from senior stages come along to the church to join in our schools' programmes, we feel that an important aim is that they enjoy the experience, as well as learn something new. It is also important that the children feel comfortable with all the helpers and enjoy engaging with them. The evaluation sheets given to both children and the teachers and adults who accompany them, let us know how they have felt about the experience. The dates of the programme were a little later than usual this year and the children's comments were not as full as they sometimes are, perhaps due to pressures in schools as they approach Christmas. However, generally the majority really enjoyed the experience. Some of the comments from children and adults included the following, as well as giving us feedback on what might be improved.

### Children

Going to the church was nice.

I liked writing the candles and thinking of other people for a bit.

I learned about waiting.

It was so fun playing a Roman soldier. I liked seeing everyone laugh.

I liked hearing about Zaccheus and learning that there is something sweet in someone mean.

### <u>Adults</u>

Thank you so much for having us – children and adults thoroughly enjoyed it.

Children who can struggle to engage were able to access the activities and all abilities were able to ioin in too.

Good structure and short & sweet activities kept the children interested and busy.

Many thanks for another lovely morning to get us in the Christmas spirit.

I just wanted to say thank you to all the church volunteers for providing the Bubblegum and Fluff workshops for the children. I have heard so many positive comments and it is lovely still to have this link with Park Church (Depute Headteacher).

### **Giving to Grow**

This is the national scheme through which the Church of Scotland Stewardship and Finance Department assesses all congregations for contributions to enable ministry and mission to be provided not only in our parish but across the country.

Park Church's Giving to Grow contribution for the year 2025 is £71,045, which is paid in monthly instalments. The congregation is paying 100% towards the cost of our ministry, but is also contributing £7,830 towards ministry in other places. This is helping to support and sustain congregations that are not currently in a position to cover the cost of the ministries allocated to them. All charges also pay a contribution towards shared activities - those programmes and services which are provided by the Church nationally. Our congregation's contribution to these shared activities for 2025 is £12,400.

The Church of Scotland thanks all who support this congregation to meet these demands by their voluntary giving. This Giving to Grow contribution is the main expenditure of our congregation. Spending on utilities is, by contrast, costing the congregation around £2,000 per month.

Gift Aid is a scheme that allows charities to receive money from the government. Anyone who is a taxpayer can, by signing a simple form, help their charity (Park Church: Stirling) at no cost to themselves. This is an important source of income for the Church, being 9%. Forms can be obtained from Catherine Jones, Church Treasurer.



### The Christian Calendar


The Christian Calendar is divided up by festivals and seasons.

Some, like Christmas Day, happen on the same date every year, while others move around within a range of dates. The main festival that moves is Easter, and since many other festivals have their dates fixed in relation to Easter, they move with it.

### Lent (5<sup>th</sup> March - 17<sup>th</sup> April 2025)

Lent is the 40-day period before Easter, beginning with Ash Wednesday and ending on Maundy Thursday. During Lent, Christians may fast, or give up some of their usual routine, to give time to personal examination and to reflect on their relationship with God.





### Holy Week (13th - 19th April 2025)

Holy Week is the last week of Lent. It is the week preceding Easter and the period in the Christian year when Christians remember the last week in Jesus' life.

### **EASTER**

Easter is the season in which Christians remember the death and resurrection of Jesus. It is the most important festival in the Christian year.

Good Friday - 18<sup>th</sup> April Holy Saturday - 19<sup>th</sup> April Easter Sunday / Easter Day - 20<sup>th</sup> April Easter Monday - 21<sup>st</sup> April

### Ascension Day (29th May 2025)

Ascension Day commemorates the ascension of Jesus into heaven 40 days after his resurrection from the dead. It can be understood traditionally as his taking up into heaven at the conclusion of his earthly ministry.

### Season of Pentecost (8<sup>th</sup> June 2025)

Pentecost is the festival when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is celebrated on the Sunday fifty days after Easter. Pentecost is also known as Whitsun.

### WaterAid Lent Appeal 2025

### **Jars of Change**



Lent starts this year on 5<sup>th</sup> March and ends on 19<sup>th</sup> April.



This year's appeal concerns women having babies without access to clean water. In many parts of the world, mothers have to worry about protecting their families from disease. They may have to sacrifice hours to walk to a river and collect water for their families, pregnant or carrying a baby all the way. The river water may be dirty, but there is no option. Every trip may mean time away from home or lost opportunities to earn income.

For pregnant women like Mastewal, drinking dirty water risks dangerous infections. Collecting water increases the likelihood of complications. And giving birth in hospitals without clean water, where staff cannot wash their hands or equipment, puts mothers and babies at risk of deadly infections like sepsis. So, will you support WaterAid, and bring clean water to more mothers like Mastewal?

The congregation has, for many years, supported this appeal by giving up something for Lent, eg. long showers, less coffees or wasting food. For this appeal, you can put the money saved in a Jam Jar and hand it into the church on the two Sundays at the end of Lent - 20<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> April. If you wish to Gift Aid your donation, labels will be available at the front and back doors from Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> March to put inside your jam jar with your donation. ### God's Plan

As some of you may know, my school career was not always easy for me. I tried my best, but often my dyslexia was a barrier not only to my reading, writing and spelling, but also to my processing of information and working memory. This meant that if the teacher was presenting a lot of information, I couldn't take it in fast enough and of that I could take in, only a portion went into my long-term memory, unless I did something practical with the information I had just heard or read. My escape from this stress was always kayaking, where I felt free and accepted.

As I approached the end of fifth year, I decided that I wanted to leave school, but did not know what direction to go in. I had at one point wanted to be a quantity surveyor, then I thought of cyber security (computers make sense to my brain), then I thought of joining the Army as part of their cyber security and data communications division, but none of these seemed quite right. Luckily, one of the organisers at kayaking suggested a course in sports and adventure coaching at Kelvin College in Glasgow, which sounded right up my street.

So I applied and received an unconditional offer within 3 days. I was delighted and really enjoyed the course, taking on as many extra qualifications as I could during it.

At the end of the course, one of my lecturers suggested I apply for a 2 year apprenticeship with Scripture Union as a trainee activities instructor, so I did. I was invited to a selection camp where I got to try out a lot of the activities and was then offered the job, which I gladly accepted.

I now live at Lendrick Muir in Kinross, and instruct children and young people in kayaking, climbing, mountain biking and many other outdoor pursuits. Further information about this centre can be found at www.lendrickmuir.org.uk.

I feel I have been incredibly lucky to end up with a job which I love. I find it so rewarding and thank God for guiding me into this career, even though at times I could not see his plan. I suppose it was always there and this is where I am meant to be.


### **Addition to the Church Library**

### Horn Solo - Dr John David Smith



Music has been a constant in his life, as he plays several instruments, including the ukulele, clarinet, accordion, and even the bagpipes. In fact, he once played his accordion while crossing the Arctic Circle on a ferry - an image that perfectly captures his love for both music and adventure.

Even at 90, Dr McIntosh remains active and engaged. A keen gardener, he still tends to his own garden, keeping it in immaculate condition. His energy and enthusiasm show no signs of fading - his next planned adventure? A hot air balloon trip!

Dr Ian McIntosh is a true inspiration. His life reminds us that adventure, service, and lifelong learning know no age limit. We celebrate his incredible journey and look forward to hearing about many more of his fascinating experiences in the years to come!


